- The English department organized a three-day theatre workshop for the students in the month of September with the aim of introducing the students to the nuances of the world of theatre and dramatics. The well-known theatre personality, Ms. Rajyashree Dutt was the resource person for the workshop.
- 7 The department also organized COLOQUY- a Two-day Spoken English Workshop for the school children sponsored by the Extra-Mural Studies and Extension Services, Goa University for the students of Union High School, Assagao and New English High School, Keri on 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> February, 2017. The students of 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> standard of the school along with their teachers attended the workshop. Dr. Anthony A. A. Viegas, Director of Extra-Mural Studies and Extension Services, Dept. of Earth Science, Goa University was the chief guest for the function. Ms. Priya Almeida, resource person graced the occasion
- The department conducted a two-day workshop on 'Basics of Archaeology' on the 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> July, 2017. The Resource person for the Workshop was Mr. Varad Sabnis Assistant Superintending Archaeologist Directorate of Archives and Archaeology. Government of Goa. A background of art and architecture was provided to them as well as the history of epigraphy, palaeography and numismatics in India. The workshop was attended by 38 students.
- 9 The Computer Science department organized a one-day workshop on "HIBERNATE". The resource person was Mr. Mahesh Matha, Assistant Professor, Smt. Parvatibai Chowgule College, and Margao. Hibernate was an object-relational mapping tool for the Java programming language.
- 10 Ms. Pooja Bidye conducted a one-day workshop for the faculty of the department on "How to take online feedback using Google Forms". They were trained on how to customize the form for individual use which would foster efficient conduct of the feedback collection process.

- 11 The department conducted a workshop on "CYBER-ENABLED MULTIMEDIA APPLICATIONS" on 26th February, 2018 for the students of Shri Ganesh Vidhya Mandir High School Mapusa, which provided them hand-on experience on image manipulation, audio editing and video presentation. In order to provide additional knowledge about the latest trends in cyber world, video sessions on latest tools and techniques of cyber space were also created and presented.
- 12 The department organised a six-day workshop on PCB AND CIRCUIT DESIGNING for Generic Elective Students from 6<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> October, 2017. In this workshop, students were made familiar with the PROTEUS software and its application and the participants implemented various circuits such as Automatic streetlights controlled by the intensity of sunlight, Light flasher etc. using software. The PCB for the same was designed and etched. Also, the hardware circuit was constructed and tested on the designed PCBs.

Introduction of Choice based Credit System. The main features of the Choice Based Credit System are as follows

- 1. Introduction of uniform grading system instead of conventional numeric scores and marks.
- 2. Facilitate seamless mobility of students across institutions with in India and world
- 3. Flexibility in designing curriculum and assigning credits based on the course content and hours of teaching.
- 4. The choice based credit system provides a 'cafeteria' type approach in which the students can take courses of their choice based on their interest.
- 5. The students can pace their own learning
- 6. Students can undergo additional courses and acquire more than the required credits, and also opt for an interdisciplinary approach to learning.
- 7. Under the CBCS provides choice for students to select from the prescribed courses (core, elective or minor or soft skill courses).
- 8. CBCS will provide students wide options to choose the courses of their interested leading to greater passion for learning
- It will enhance not just cognitive intelligence but emotional, spiritual, social
  and moral intelligence leading to linking higher education to the needs of
  community.
- 10. Flexibility in designing and introducing new innovative courses will help in enhancing the employability of students.
